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MCA EXTENDS CONDOLENCES TO FAMILY & FRIENDS OF **TIMOTHY "DOOLEY" THOMPSON**



passing of Timothy "Dooley" Thompson, a beloved member of our community and a dedicated leader who served with wisdom, strength, and compassion.

Timothy "Dooley" Thompson was a guiding force in Akwesasne, serving seven terms as a District Chief and one term as Grand Chief. Throughout his years of public service, his leadership left an indelible mark on our community. Dooley's commitment to Akwesasne was evident in his numerous achievements, including the 2008 final settlement agreement with Ontario Power Generation and his unwavering leadership during the 42-day bridge closure in 2009. As Chair of the Independent First Nations Executive Committee, he ensured Akwesasne's voice was heard among the 12 First Nations he represented.

Dooley's dedication extended beyond the Council Chambers. I was fortunate to work with him both as District Chief and Grand Chief for the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne," shared Ontario Regional Chief and former MCA Grand Chief Abram Benedict. "Dooley was a leader who possessed deep knowledge and respect for his position and for the community. I often reached out to him for guidance on important matters facing Akwesasne. Dooley never shied away from a challenge; he faced every task head-on. This was especially true during his battle with cancer. He told the council that cancer would be no different from any other challenge he had faced. RETURN OF CAIRN ISLAND TO AKWESASNE RESERVE

The Akwesasne Rights & Research Office (ARRO) The island, deeply woven into the identity and is pleased to announce that after over 15 years of traditions of the Mohawk people, will once again diligent efforts through the Additions to Reserve serve as a place of cultural and historical significance (ATR) process, Cairn Island has been formally returned for Akwesasne. to the Akwesasne Reserve through Ministerial Order. restore land to its rightful owners.

Cairn Island, located within the traditional territory of the Mohawks of Akwesasne, holds immense cultural and historical importance to our community. Expropriated in 1922, the land was removed from Akwesasne's care and designated as a historic site under Parks Canada's supervision. The expropriation stemmed from use of the island in the mid-1800s, when the Glengarry Highlanders erected a monument, or "cairn," without consent from the community.

The successful return of Cairn Island through Ministerial Order is a testament to the resilience of the Mohawks of Akwesasne and our commitment to reclaiming our lands.

- » AMPS Police Technology: The software that is being used for criminal identification is becoming too slow compared to the industry standard. Chief of Police Ranatiiostha Swamp wants to implement a new software called OPTIC to allow for better criminal identification.

December 23, 2024

- Confidentiality Breach: The discussion focused on addressing a leaked Mohawk Council Resolution (MCR) and its impact on trust and confidentiality. Concerns were raised about the recurring nature of leaks and their detrimental effect on the council's integrity and community trust. Proposed solutions included relocating meetings to more secure locations, introducing tighter security measures such as room sweeps, and increasing transparency by publicly sharing MCRs and meeting updates. The group emphasized the need for collaboration, strategic planning, and open communication to rebuild trust and prevent future leaks, with action items set to investigate the breach and improve governance prac-
- NYS Land Claims: The discussion addressed the need for better communication and public education in the future regarding ongoing issues, particularly land claims. Concerns were raised about insufficient efforts to educate the community and provide updates, with some expressing dissatisfaction about requests for information not yielding results. It was emphasized that any specific information needs should be formally brought to the council table for discussion. The group agreed that more proactive efforts are needed to inform and involve the com-

- munity, particularly with upcoming topics like the Nutfield track.
- Community Holiday Dinners: The discussion focused on issues surrounding the quality and safety of catering services at the Holiday Dinner events, highlighting complaints about food preparation and delivery practices. Concerns included the use of nonfood-grade containers, lack of proper hygiene protocols (e.g., no hairnets or gloves), and insufficient equipment for large-scale catering. It was suggested that future events involve stricter oversight, including inspections by environmental health officials and certification requirements for vendors, as used in other events like powwows. Proposals included having District Chiefs play a more active role in selecting caterers, revising the Request for Proposal (RFP) process to prioritize quality and certification over cost, and exploring alternatives like gift cards instead of meals. There were also discussions about ensuring appropriate facilities for events and addressing community perceptions of fairness and accountability. Action items included reviewing liability issues and improving the RFP process to prevent similar problems in the fu-Whoville Road Unauthorized Access:
- The discussion centered on a resident's unauthorized actions, including connecting water and power to their property in the Whoville Road area. Concerns were raised about who, if anyone, granted permission for these activities, as the land in question is under MCA jurisdiction. The council agreed that the Executive Director (ED) should investigate the matter to determine if permissions were given and assess the legality of the connections. It was noted that the resident might have misunderstood the property boundaries.
- **ED Update:** The ED discussed various

- updates, including resolving a community water heater issue through donation funds, progress on the fiber optic project with pending service package details, and positive feedback from the Christmas party. Meetings were planned for lobbying strategies and budget coordination. A new member was appointed to manage CBSA communications, while space requests for the Council were declined by the CEO. Staffing updates included the Chief of Police job posting and plans for an AMPS community survey. Concerns were raised about combining the Director of Public Safety and Chief of Police roles, with further discussions planned. A whistleblowing policy is in development, and water issues are being addressed with relevant managers.

Update on N.Y. State Land Claim Settlement:

- **Issue:** Following extensive negotiations and recent submissions to the Judge/Magistrate, key stakeholders in the New York Land Claim Settlement have indicated their positions regarding the agreements. Most parties are ready to approve the settlement, while MNCC Mohawk Nation Council of Chiefs has requested more time to decide.
- Current Status: Franklin and St Lawrence Counties - ready to approve the settlement.
- New York State and Agencies Ready to approve the settlement.
- **SRMT:** Ready to approve the settlement.
- MNCC: Requires more time to deliberate.

Key Settlement Terms:

ISLAND ACCESS — Access to Croil, Long Sault, and parts of Barnhart Island for hunting, fishing gathering under Mohawk Council Standards Right of first refusal for the Mohawk Council if the state sells portions of these Islands.

TUITION BENEFITS — Up to eight semesters tuition waivers at SUNY schools for Akwesasne Mohawk students enrolled with one of the

Tuition reductions to instate SUNY rates for Cornell University and Alfred University.

LOW-COST POWER — NYPA will provide 9 megawatts of low-cost power for SRMT and

FINANCIAL PAYMENT — \$70 million over 35 years (\$2 million annually) distribution - SRMT 60% MCA 20% MNCC 20%.

LAND REACQUISITION — SRMT may purchase land within designated settlement areas near 1796 Treaty Reservation Boundaries from willing sellers. Acquired lands will gain reservation status with MCA and MNCC notified acquisitions.

Key Considerations:

The agreement includes substantial benefits for all Akwesasronon regardless of residency, promoting education, resources access, community energy needs, and financial stability.

MCA has spent \$6,255,860.09 USD on legal fees alone for the New York State Land Claim to date.





AKWESASNE RIGHTS AND RESEARCH OFFICE — 2024 YEAR IN REVIEW

The Akwesasne Rights and Research Office (ARRO) had a dynamic and impactful year in 2024, with several significant initiatives that contributed to the advancement of our perspectives and inherent rights.

7 ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2024:

1. CAIRN ISLAND RETURNS TO RESERVE STATUS

ARRO successfully completed the Additions to Reserve (ATR) process for Cairn Island, officially returning the island to reserve status. This achievement strengthens Akwesasne's land base and reaffirms ARRO's ongoing commitment to supporting land rights and sovereignty within the community.



2. SEAWAY CLAIM ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

A focus on environmental studies related to the Seaway Claim, focusing on Yellow Island and Kawehno:ke.

Yellow Island Erosion Study

In collaboration with Aqua Solutions 5 Inc., ARRO participated in a comprehensive erosion study of Yellow Island. The study involved drone footage and photographs of the entire shoreline, taken from both boat and land-based perspectives. Several profile surveys were conducted on the shoreline banks and bluffs, extending into the nearshore area. The gathered data will be critical for assess-

ing the environmental health of Yellow Island and informing future conservation efforts.

Kawehno:ke Agronomist Study

ARRO also assisted with an agronomist study on Kawehno:ke, involving the collection and testing of soil samples. The findings from this study will provide important data that will help with assessing the cost of remediation.

3. NEW YORK STATE CLAIM

ARRO supported the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne's leadership in negotiations related to the New York State Claim. ARRO provided critical assistance, offering expertise and guidance to ensure that Akwesasne's interests were effectively represented. Additionally, ARRO hosted an information session for Akwesasne community members, keeping them informed about the progress of the claim and its potential impact on the community.

4. INDIGENOUS STEWARDSHIP POLICY WITH **PARKS CANADA**

ARRO, alongside District Chiefs Scott Peters and Vince Thompson and Grand Chief Leonard Lazore, attended the Indigenous Stewardship Policy event. After several years of collaboration with Indigenous partners, the policy was officially approved and enacted on October 15, 2024. This milestone was celebrated in a formal ceremony with Minister Steven Guilbeault and members of the Indigenous Stewardship Circle. The policy represents a significant step forward in fostering First Nations-led environmental stewardship practices in partnership with Canada.

Parks Canada's Indigenous Stewardship Policy will guide the implementation of the Indigenous Stewardship Framework, fostering ethical space, respect-

These efforts reflect ARRO's deep commitment to preserving and protecting Akwesasne's As ARRO continues to advocate for the recognition cultural heritage.

6. CULTURAL AWARENESS TRAINING WITH CBSA

ARRO conducted two cultural awareness training sessions for the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) at the Cornwall and Dundee Points of Entry in 2024.



Hazard Help Sheet: DO ONE THING!

Do 1 Thing is a web-based 12-month preparedness program that focuses on a different area of emergency preparedness, and provides a range of preparedness options for each topic. Every month has a low or no cost option to become better prepared. You can jump in at anytime, so let's begin!

Small Steps Towards Being Prepared for an Emergency

Month	Do 1 Thing	What You Can Do
January	Make a Plan	Understand what puts you at risk from disasters and take steps to lower your risk.
February	Water	Have 72 hours (3 days) worth of water stored for your household.
March	Sheltering	Know how to respond safely when instructions are given to evacuate or take shelter.
April	Food	Have an emergency food supply that will meet the needs of your household for three days without outside help.
May	Work, School, Community	Make sure the people who count on you are prepared for a disaster.
June	Unique Family Needs	Be aware of and prepare for your family's unique needs.
July	Family Communication Plan	Have the ability to communicate with family members during a disaster.
August	Get Involved	Make your community stronger by getting trained and getting involved.
September	Be Informed	Make sure everyone in your household can receive, understand, and act on information received in an emergency.
October	Power	Be able to safely meet your basic needs during an electrical outage.
November	Emergency Supplies	Remember important items that may be overlooked when leaving your home in a disaster.
December	First Aid	Be prepared to give first aid while waiting for an ambulance.
