





MCA UPDATE ON NEW YORK STATE LAND CLAIM

OFFICE OF THE GRAND CHIEF & COUNCIL **COMMUNITY NOTICE**

For Immediate Release: Kentenhko:wa/November 14, 2024

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA) scheduled a community meeting on November 23, 2024, to provide an update on the pending proposed Settlement Agreement in the New York State land claim. After many years of negotiations, and the MCA continues to support the settlement of this most recent submissions to the Judge/Magistrate, the parties have reported:

- Franklin and St. Lawrence counties are ready to approve the settlement;
- New York State and its agencies are ready to approve the settlement;
- The Saint Regis Mohawk Tribal Council (SRMT) is ready to approve the settlement;
- The Mohawk Nation Council of Chiefs (MNCC) require more time to decide on an approval;

The Settlement agreement includes benefits for cannot make claims for land taken 200 years ago. all Akwesasronon, regardless of residency, which include:

- Free State University of New York college tuition for all Akwesasronon, who are admitted to SUNY schools, regardless of residency.
- The right to fish and gather on Barnhart, Croil, and to 5 p.m. Long Sault Islands, and to hunt and trap on these islands with some restrictions.
- 9 megawatts of low-cost power that SRMT and

MCA can purchase from the New York Power Authority.

- The return of land in several areas to Akwesasne Territory, including land in the Hogansburg Trian-
- \$70 Million in payments made over 35 years by NYPA to SRMT, MCA, and MNCC

42-year-old claim, originally filed by MCA in 1982, focusing on regaining the islands. The hard work of many community members over the years has resulted in an agreement that ensures continued use of the Islands.

In 1989, the SRMT & MNCC filed their own claim for lands and Islands, which the court combined with MCA's lawsuits into one claim. This is the last New York State land claim, as others were extinguished by the 2005 U.S. Supreme Court ruling in the City of Sherrill vs. Oneida Indian Nation which ruled tribes

COUNCIL WEEKLY MEETING REPORT

October 28, 2024

 SRMT Meeting: Discussion on meeting with the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe (SRMT) on Friday. Council noted they would like more information on the NYS Claim. Council noted they would like an update from ARRO regarding the file. M. Herne, ED noted ARRO is available on October 29th or 30th to meet; Council agreed to meet on October 29th

- with ARRO and F. Holloman. It was also suggested for the 2004 results to be shared with Council.
- Safe Zone Committee: A community member asked if the Safe Zone Committee is still going to continue with the departure of a staff member. ED noted he will follow up with Department of Health (DOH) Wholistic Health and Wellness Program.
- Council Communication Protocol: Question to Council if they reviewed the Protocol from Communications. It was noted if there are questions or concerns to forward it on to the Associate Director of Communications.
- **Donation Request/Corporate Sponsorship:** Brief discussion on the recent donation requests that Council has received (Haude-

- nosaunee Lacrosse, American Legion Post 1479, Akwesasne Freedom School) and corporate sponsorship. Draft Corporate Policy is not yet completed and is with ED office. It was noted the American Legion Post 1479 is looking for a monetary donation to help pave their driveway; it is estimated \$101,980 USD to pave. A motion was made to approve \$35,000 CAD. All of Council was in favor.
- MCRs: '24-25 #270 Safeguarding Our Elders -- Elders Abuse Prevention MOU; '24-25 #271 MMIWG; '24-25 #272 Extension of Service Contract -- FFTH Nawash Utilities; '24-25 #273 Council Meeting Minutes dated October 7, 2024; '24-25 #274 Council Meeting Minutes dated October 21, 2024.

November 4, 2024

- Council Meeting: Scheduled for November 11; moved to November 12 because of the Remembrance Day holiday.
- General Meeting: Staying consistent with our policy (held on the last Thursday of every month), which falls onto November 28th.
- COO/IFN Committees: Are actively looking for members but need to provide chiefs with briefing notes to make educated decisions.
- Corda Funding: The community

- must submit proposals to ensure fairness. ISC provides \$35,000 with a deadline of October 7th, 2024 (which has passed) the next is in 2025. Discussion was held on possible future submissions.
- NYS Land Claim Mediation Contract Extension: Council recommends an extension to the contract along with a briefing note to further educate (the importance of this position to the US Land Claim?).
- NYS Land Claim Communication:

- Council recommends an increase of communication to the community about the settlement, potentially a member portal or a shortterm communication plan.
- JTBA Update: Council members are part of established tables in the government of Canada now.
- JTBA Funding: Council needs more information to identify where to channel this fund.
- Holiday Meals: Council agreed to give out meals in each district of Akwesasne. The council still needs

- Public Safety: General safety will be investigated because of the fireworks problem on Halloween and during the summer months.
- Council Lobbying Strategy: Council wants to implement a lobbying strategy class to educate Council members.
- Peace Tree Mall: Council wants to put one-way signs at the Peace Tree Mall back road to ensure public safety.
- Holiday Dinners: The General Meeting in December will be cancelled so that Council can host community holiday dinners.
- COO: Council members will be attending the Chiefs of Ontario Conference over Zoom, while the Grand Chief will be attending in person. Chief Scott Peters will be Chair of the Council meeting on

November 18th.

- COO Women's Committee: The Chiefs' attendance will be updated.

 When a death occurs near the scheduled district meeting, it will be up to the district chiefs to decide to if the meeting will be held.
- Staff reaching out to Council:
 Council members have a difference in opinion as it relates to staff reaching out to Council members for assistance when submitting work-related complaints. The Grand Chief informed the Council that all communications received by Grand Chief shall be forwarded to the Council and the Executive Director and it will be their responsibility to determine how they will proceed.
- Grand Chief shall continue to advise everyone to follow established procedures, document all steps and will refer all issues to the Executive Director.
- General Meeting Rules of Order: The MCR for General Meeting date scheduling needs to be amended and brought up at the next Council meeting.

Monthly Report: November 2024

NOVEMBER 1, 2024:

Meeting with CBSA Regional Director General: The MCA-CBSA Border NOVEMBER 5, 2024: Collaboration Initiative was officially launched in January of 2020, as a result of ground-breaking "designthinking" sessions that were held to identify challenges and opportunities for collaboration between Akwesasne & CBSA. Design Thinking is a strategic method of designing or improving Administrative Trustees Interviews for a service or product with the user in mind. It encourages an organization, for example, to consider who they are creating services for, which then naturally improves the user experience. After making introductions of new MCA Council Members, the group discussed ways to address challenges for medical transports, the remission order, posting wait times on CBSA website that includes the Dundee port of entry, and development of various training initiatives for CBSA officers and frequent travellers of the ports.

Telephone call with AFNQL Regional Chief (prior to AFNQL Assembly November 4 to 6) for Grand Chief to let Regional Chief Picard know that his meeting schedule prevented him from attending the AFNQL Assembly in person, and that MCA was sending continuity of critical government a Proxy. NOVEMBER 6, 2024:

Entewatatha:wi Portfolio Meeting reviewed the Nation Building Mission, Vision, and background of the negotiations between MCA and the Government of Canada for the Entewatatha:wi Self Government Agreement (ESGA). MCA is in the latter stages of negotiations to exercise governance and jurisdiction. The ESGA is a government-to-government relationship between Akwesasne and Canada. Two legal instruments that are to be finalized along with ESGA are the Akwesasne Land Law and the Fiscal Relationship Agreement. These two companion pieces will ensure functions. The negotiations are ongoing. The Entewatathawi team are thoughtful and methodical as they astutely carry forward this file through each year and term of Council. Their dedication to this community work is appreciated.

The Iroquois Caucus was formed in 2005 to provide opportunity for the Haudenosaunee communities of Kahnawa:ke, Kanehsata:ke, Akwesasne, Tyendinaga, Wahta, Six Nations and Oneida of the Thames to assemble and discuss shared issues and concerns. They meet to discuss challenges such as Border Crossing, Hunting Rights, They have a combined membership of almost 75,000 people.

Iroquois Caucus (IC) Orientation was presented by IC Coordinator Amy Lickers, who provided an Advocacy Overview to all Council. She covered governance, political advocacy of Indigenous Relations and External Relations. Political advocacy are actions that represent, promote, or defend interests (or rights), influence public policy and legislation, and the process of influencing networks, opinion leaders and decision makers.

The IC is funded through an agreed contribution by each community. This has allowed the IC to maintain its autonomy.





A notary public in Ontario holds the same powers as a commissioner for taking affidavits except they can also certify and attest to the execution of a document and to true copies of an original document. They can also verify that signatures and marks of a document are genuine. Ontario notary's are usually lawyers.

New York notaries are empowered to administer oaths and affirmations (including oaths of office), to take affidavits and depositions, to receive and certify acknowledgments or proofs (of execution) of deeds, mortgages and powers of attorney and other instruments in writing.

SPECIFIC CLAIMS UPDATE: NUTFIELD TRACT

This article is to inform the community about the history of the Nutfield Tract was smaller than originally promised and unsuitable Nutfield Tract and its status as a Specific Claim.

HISTORICAL SUMMARY PRE-1784:

Multiple groups settled the territory of Akwesasne. One group of Mohawks and a Jesuit priest from Kahnawake established the St. Regis Parish in 1754. Father Antoine Gordon is said to have apthe St. Lawrence River for the Mohawks use.

In 1763 The British Crown issued The Royal Proclamation of 1763 to protect the territories of Britain's Indian allies and neutral nations by prohibiting private purchases of lands. The Chiefs of St. Regis would leverage "promises" from the French and British Crowns to assert their land rights against encroaching settlers.

Following the American Revolution in 1783, Crown Officials in Canada sought land to accommodate Loyalist Refugees and decommissioned regiments. Surveyors began plotting townships on the Northern Shore of the St. Lawrence but were stopped by the Chiefs of St. Regis, who claimed the land as their territory and requested council to resolve the dispute.

In 1784 Colonel Campbell was sent by John Johnson to Coteaudu-Lac to negotiate with the Chiefs. Cambell insisted there was no French deed for the lands and accused the Mohawks of making unreasonable demands. Eventually, the Chiefs agreed to retain a reserve nine miles wide, while the remaining lands were surveyed and became Loyalist townships, with Johnstown (Cornwall) as the first incorporated settlement.

THE NUTFIELD TRACT SURVEYS

McNiff's Survey of 1786

Patrick McNiff, an Irish surveyor who had previously worked in the American colonies, was hired by Sir John Johnson to survey the boundaries of the new townships. McNiff began his work from the east, moving westward. When he encountered the Raisin River and its swampy terrain, he bypassed the area and marked what he believed to be the western boundary line. This error would remain unaddressed by the Indian Affairs Department for several decades.

McCarthy's Survey of 1809

By 1809, the Chiefs of St. Regis had held the Nutfield Tract for 25 years. That year, Jeremiah McCarthy was commissioned, using council funds, to survey the boundaries of the Nutfield Tract. Mc-Carthy completed the survey and identified discrepancies in Mc-Niff's original work: McNiff had avoided the swampy terrain and extended the boundary five lots eastward of the correct location.

In a complaint to the Governor General, the Chiefs noted that the

for hunting. This forced them to lease the land to white settlers as a means of livelihood. However, the Chiefs' complaint also noted that many settlers were not paying their dues, particularly those occupying land excluded from the reserve by McNiff's survey.

SURRENDER OF NUTFIELD TRACT, 1847

pealed to the French Crown for a deed to the Northern Shore of The issues with the erroneous survey and unpaid rents remained unresolved for years. Despite correspondence and petitions to the Indian Department, no substantial action was taken. Ultimately, the Nutfield Tract was "surrendered" on June 1, 1847, with 27 Chiefs of St. Regis signing the surrender agreement.

CURRENT UPDATE, 2024

The Akwesasne Rights and Research Office (ARRO), in collaboration with their legal counsel, Gowling WLG, submitted a Specific Claim for the Nutfield Tract Survey to the Specific Claims Branch of Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIR-NAC) on September 2, 2022. The claim seeks equitable compensation for the cost of commissioning the survey that identified the errors and for lost revenue from the excluded lands.

Once a claim is submitted, CIRNAC has six months to review whether it meets the Minimum Standard for a Specific Claim. On January 18, 2023, the Grand Chief was notified that the claim had met the Minimum Standard and would proceed to a three-year review process.

A decision from the Specific Claims Branch on whether the claim is accepted for negotiations is tentatively expected in 2026.

NON-INSURED HEALTH BENEFITS PROVIDES UPDATE TO COMMUNITY ON BENEFITS COVERAGE

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne's Non-Insured Health Benefits Program (NIHB) is providing an update to the community on what the program is able to provide coverage for, and what they are unable to provide. The NIHB reminds the community that the program is not a substitute for provincial health plan coverage. A valid health card and status card number are required for all services available.

To be eligible for coverage, you must have the following (no exceptions):

- Are registered with the Mohawks of Akwesasne
- Be a resident of Canada
- Possess a valid provincial health card (OHIP, RAMQ/ QHIP, etc.)

NIHB can provide coverage for the following:

Vision Care

- Eyeglasses that are prescribed by a vision care professional
- Eye Examinations

Frequency Guideline

- 1-17yrs & 65yrs + will be covered for one (1) frame per year
- 18-64 years old will be covered for one (1) frame every two years (2)

Dental Care

- Preventative services: polishing, scaling, exams, radiographs (x-rays)
- Restorative services: fillings, crowns
- Orthodontic services: braces (0-17 year olds)
- Dentures, extractions, root canal treatments

Pharmacy Benefits

• Prescription and over-the-counter medications ext. 3340. (to view the full Drug Benefit List, please visit www.sac-isc.gc.ca)

Exception drugs

Steps for Exception Drugs

- 1. Obtain prescription from healthcare provider
- 2. Go the pharmacist to get your prescription filled. The pharmacist will contact NIHB directly to obtain approval.
- 3. NIHB will process approval and your pharmacist will contact you when the decision is made

Medical Supplies and Equipment

- Pressure garments and compression stockings
- Medical supplies (dressings, bandages, etc.)
- Medical equipment (walkers, crutches, etc.)
- Orthotics and custom footwear
- Oxygen supplies and equipment
- Hearing aids

Services that are NOT Covered:

- US/American medical bills
- Dental implants
- Medical marijuana
- Fertility medications
- Weight loss medications
- Benefits that are covered under federal or provincial health cards
- Cosmetic procedures
- Transportation for personal errands
- Vehicle repairs/home renovations
- Claims submitted to NIHB after one year from the date of service or purchase



Sausage Bake with Vegetables

Serves: 4

Ingredients

- 1 large red onion, sliced ¼ inch
- 3 large carrots, sliced on an angle ½ inch thịch
- ½ acorn squash, sliced and gutted and cut into ¾ inch thich
- 3 potatoes, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 3 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 1 tsp salt
- ½ tsp black pepper
- 1 tsp dried thyme
- 450g mild Italian sausage (or any other sausage that you

Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 425°F and set an oven rack in the middle position. Line a 13 x 18-inch baking sheet.
- 2. Directly on the baking sheet, toss the onion, carrots, and acorn squash, green beans, olive oil, salt, pepper, and thyme until the vegetables are evenly coated. Place the sausages on the baking sheet, spacing them evenly around the pan, and arrange the vegeatbles as best you can in a single layer. Roast for 25-30 minutes, until the sausages are cooked through and the vegetables are caramelized and tender (no need to stir while cooking).

Note:

Feel free to substitute with different vegetables, such as baby potatoes (halved), sweet potatoes (cut into 1-inch chunks), large broccoli or cauliflower florets, or even grapes.
