

#### OFFICIAL SIGNING CEREMONY FOR TSIKARISTISERE TRUST

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne is proud to announce the Grand Chief Leonard Lazore addressed the significance of the successful signing ceremony of the Tsikaristisere Trust, which took place on Thursday, January 23, 2025, at the Tsi Snaihne Recreation Center. This event marked the formal establishment of the trust, with Trustees and Council members officially signing the documents in the presence of community members.

In 2015, Canada presented a Land Claim Settlement Offer to the Mohawks of Akwesasne, including the opportunity to reclaim 18,282 acres of land through Canada's Additions to Reserve Process and a monetary settlement of \$239,808,436.00. This settlement addressed claims related to the historically leased lands known as Tsikaristisere, or 'Dundee.'

Following negotiations, the final agreement was put to a referendum vote, conducted online and by ballot from October 1 to December 8, 2018. The community approved the settlement, with the results validated on January 7, 2020.

The creation of the Tsikaristisere Trust marks a major milestone in this journey, reflecting a commitment to responsibly manage the settlement's resources. The Trustees are tasked with holding, managing, and investing the Trust Property in accordance with the terms of the agreement for the benefit of the Beneficiaries. A primary priority of the Trust is the purchase of land to be set apart as reserve land for the Mohawks of Akwesasne under Article 3.2 and 5.0 of the Settlement Agreement and additionally, through community consultation, the following areas were identified as community needs and priorities:

We also extend our appreciation to the community members who have

Since the initial payment from Canada, the settlement fund has been in the RBC and as of December 31, 2024, is now valued at \$259,683,600.93. These funds are now able to be transferred to the Tsikaristisere Trust, where they will grow at a significantly quicker pace.

## MOHAWK COUNCIL OF AKWESASNE HOSTS IROQUOIS CAUCUS STRATEGIC PLANNING SESSION

hosted the Iroquois Caucus Strategic Planning Session. Elected action and collaborating to create positive outcomes. The sesleaders from Haudenosaunee communities in Ontario and Quebec, as well as their technical teams, gathered to discuss shared strengthen efforts to protect and advance the interests of their priorities and strengthen collaborative efforts.

The Iroquois Caucus represents the Haudenosaunee communities: Kahnawa:ke, Kanehsata:ke, Akwesasne, Tyendinaga, Six Nations of the Grand River, and Oneida Nation of the Thames. Together, they work to protect their rights, land, language, culture, and resources, while advocating for their jurisdiction and addressing shared challenges.

The Caucus operates on the principles of Haudenosaunee governance, following the Two Row Wampum philosophy of mutual respect, peaceful coexistence, and shared responsibilities. It works collaboratively with provincial, federal, and First Nations organizations to address common issues.

The Strategic Planning Session focused on key topics, including:

- A political overview of current issues facing the communities.
- Strengthening the Iroquois Caucus and enhancing its capacity.
- Addressing the Caucus' priorities.
- Implementing the Iroquois Caucus Strategic Plan.

#### SIBC TOLL INCREASE ADDS MORE BARRIERS FOR AKWESASNE



sasne is once again expressing disappointment following the recent announcement from the Seaway International

Bridge Corporation (SIBC) of another toll increase on our main crossing. This decision, set to take effect on April 1, 2025, places an added burden on our people, impacting daily life, economic opportunities, and access to essential services. It is a step backward that disregards the challenges faced by our community and runs counter to the principles of reconciliation.

The Seaway International Bridge is more than just a crossing — it is an essential lifeline for Akwesasne. Families, businesses, service providers, and community members rely on this bridge daily for work, education, healthcare, and economic opportunities. By increasing toll fees yet again — and without consulting Akwesasronon — SIBC has imposed yet another financial strain on our people and created further barriers to the community's growth and prosperity.

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne is deeply frustrated by this announcement, particularly given that tolls were already raised in April 2024. These continued increases have a direct and harmful impact on Akwesasne residents and businesses, affecting

The Mohawk Council of Akwe- everything from service delivery and local commerce to participation in regional sports and access to transportation services such as taxis.

Grand Chief Leonard Lazore criticized the decision, stating:

"This toll increase places yet another burden on Akwesasne and is a disappointing step away from reconciliation and community development. The bridge is vital to our economy and way of life, vet these repeated toll hikes make it harder for our businesses to succeed, for our families to stay connected, and for our community to thrive. We value strong partnerships with our neighbours and stakeholders, but decisions like this undermine those relationships. Consultation and collaboration must be a priority moving forward."

The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne urges the Seaway International Bridge Corporation and the Federal Bridge Corporation to reconsider this decision and engage in meaningful dialogue with Akwesasne. It is essential that the needs and voices of our community be acknowledged in decisions that impact us so pro-

# AKWESASNE LEADERS MEET TO DISCUSS POTENTIAL BORDER IMPACTS

On February 4, 2025, the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne par-subject to potential tariffs under the Remission Order. ticipated in a Zoom meeting with representatives from the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe (SRMT), U.S. Customs and Border Protection (USCBP), and Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) to discuss concerns regarding tariffs and their potential impact on daily border crossings for Akwesasne residents.

As a collective, the following has been confirmed:

» There will be no changes to our ability to cross the border under the current Remission Order.

CBSA confirmed that the current Remission Order for Akwesasne residents remains unchanged. This order allows residents to freely cross the border for shopping, personal use, business, and community service purposes. It applies to members residing in the City of Cornwall and the islands of Akwesasne.

Additionally, personal goods purchased in Canada and transported to the districts of Tsi Snaihne and Kana:takon will not be

- There may be potential impacts such as increased border wait times due to ongoing policy changes.
- MCA is committed to meeting regularly and proactively with SRMT, USCBP, and CBSA to ensure our inherent right to border mobility is not hindered by the actions of the Canadian and U.S. governments.

Council has requested that both USCBP and CBSA provide a written summary of these discussions for further distribution to the community. Updates will be shared once available.

As border-related policies continue to evolve, maintaining strong communication between all parties remains essential.

#### **MONTHLY NOTABLES:**

- AFN Special Chiefs Assembly was held December 3-5, 2024. I attended via Zoom for December 3rd and 5th. On December 4th, Lisa Francis-Benedict and I travelled to Ottawa, ON to attend in-person.
- Attended the Holiday Dinners on December 9 (Kana:takon Recreation), December 11 (Kawehno:ke Recreation), and December 12 (Tsi Snaihne Recreation). All holiday dinners were very well attended by the community.
- Attended the Kana:takon Recreation December to Remember fundraiser from December 13-15, 2024. Laura Thompson, her family, and the Kana:takon Recreation crew did a fantastic job.

- Attended Akwesasne Strategic Planning Community Session at the Kana:takon Recreation Center.
- Attended the Circle of Leaders training. This was a good training as it provided necessary tools to help work with others in the workplace who may have differing personality types. It was interesting to see what approaches to take when dealing with others.
- Kana:takon District Meeting was held January 20, 2025 at the Kana:takon Recreation Center with only one community member in attendance.
- Attended a meeting with the Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe on January 2, 2025, regarding us working together on some possible upcoming initiatives. These meetings will take place quarterly with the next meeting scheduled in April.
- Attended the Satellite Tsi Snaihne Medical Clinic ribbon-cutting ceremony. The satellite clinic is now open to community members. This is a great step forward for the health of our community with the ability to access clinic services in all three districts.
- The Dundee Trust signing took place on January 23, 2025. The trust officially has all of its members. The community was able to partake in a meal as well to watch the event.
- Attended the Beans movie showing at the Aultsville Film Festival in Cornwall. This event had a great turnout. It was beautiful to see our very own Kiawentiio Tarbell as the star of the movie. She is an amazingly talented young lady.
- Attended Governance Training from February 4-6, 2025 with Carol Hopkins at the Kawehno:ke Recreation. This was taken by all of Council. Governance training is essential for ensuring that individuals in leadership and decisionmaking positions understand their roles, responsibilities, and the broader

implications of their actions within an organization. It fosters transparency. accountability, and ethical conduct, helping leaders navigate complex legal and regulatory frameworks aligning with organizational values. By equipping board members and executives with the tools to make informed, strategic decisions, governance training reduces risks, enhances organizational performance, and builds stakeholder trust. Moreover, it promotes a culture of continuous learning, enabling organizations to adapt to evolving challenges and governance best practices. Ultimately, effective governance training is crucial for sustaining long-term success and stability.

#### **PORTFOLIO UPDATES:**

**Dept. of Public Safety** — The Akwesasne Mohawk Police Service presented their Strategic Plan to the community in all three districts on January 6, 8, and 9, 2025 at all three district recreation centers. A2Z Strategic Consulting was present to answer any questions about the strategic plan and to take all feedback into consideration. In January 2025, AMPS conducted an online survey, giving community members the opportunity to share their feedback and help AMPS better understand the community's current needs. I attended Police Commission meetings on behalf of my district and brought all community concerns to the meeting. We had a Portfolio meeting that took place on January 31, 2025. I have had conversations with the Acting Chief of Police regarding the blue envelope initiative for community members who have autism and to see if this is something that AMPS can do. The blue envelope can be kept in a person's home or carried with them, so in case of an emergency or police interaction, officers can quickly understand the needs of the individual with autism, potentially preventing misunderstandings

or escalated situations. This initiative helps raise awareness among law enforcement along with Economic Development agencies and fosters a more understanding, patient approach when dealing with individuals on the autism spectrum. It is part of broader efforts to improve how police respond to individuals with various mental health or developmental conditions. Acting Chief of Police said that this is something that they are willing to incorporate into their strategic plan on our vulnerable community population.

Akwesasne Justice Dept. — Space needs

continue to be a concern for the Akwesasne Justice Department. This is currently being assessed and hopefully a solution is in the very near future as they wait for the Sunday Warehouse building to be complete. The Legislative Oversight Committee now has all members and has begun meeting. I have attended both of the scheduled meetings and I will be sitting on the Residency Law as well as the Child Rights Law. The Oversight Committee on Legislative Development (OSC) is requesting feedback from community members to determine which three Akwesasne Laws should be prioritized for 2025. Each year, the OSC collaborates with the Akwesasne Justice Department Portfolio Chiefs to identify, this survey will be available to the community online and your input is very valuable. More information will be provided to the community on the Legislative Enactment Procedural Regulations so that the community can have a better understanding of the proper processes that need to be taken in law amendment and development.

**Dept. of Economic Development** — We had our first portfolio meeting where the Economic Development Director did an impressive job of highlighting all areas of her program. Connections are still taking place with Ontario East and they are aware of those houses who are signed up but have yet to have a line dug to their home. In most cases these homes were difficult to access but they will be connected as soon as they

can. The Economic Development portfolio Director had an informative meeting with Public Service and Procurement Canada to discuss upcoming opportunities. Public Services and Procurement Canada has made efforts to engage and promote the inclusion of Indigenous populations in government procurement processes. These efforts are aimed at improving economic opportunities for Indigenous businesses and communities, fostering partnerships, contribute to reconciliation.

Dept. of Community & Social Services — The First Nations Child and Family Services Jordans Principle Settlement will officially open for claims on March 10, 2025. The Federal Court approved the First Nations Child and Family Services and Jordan's Principle Settlement Agreement on October 24, 2023. This agreement aims to provide compensation to individuals harmed by the discriminatory underfunding of the First Nations Child and Family Services Program and those impacted by the federal government's restrictive interpretation of Jordan's Principle. The \$23.34 billion settlement follows compensation directives from the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal in 2019, which investigated systemic discrimination against First Nations children and families.

1.465 households benefited from the Akwesasne Heating Assistance Program. This funding has been dispersed to electric companies and fuel providers. Each household received \$1,500.00.

There has also been much concern about some of our homeless community members in the City of Cornwall. The Community Support Program (CSP) has reached out to them and provided back packs with supplies as well as options were given on how CSP can assist with shelter. There is also the Persian Manor in Cornwall were there are a number of rooms designated to Akwesasne

**Dept. of Health** — On January 22, 2025 the Satellite Tsi Snaihne Medical Clinic opened its doors to the community. Blood work clinics are now available in all districts at the Akwesasne Medical Clinic (Kana:takon), Kawehno:ke Medical Clinic and Tsi Snaihne Medical Clinic in lakhihsohtha Lodge. Jordan's Principle also has a satellite office at lakhihsohtha Lodge in Tsi Snaihne (Jan. 23-Feb. 27, Thursday's only, by appointment only). Some changes have been made to the Special Need Policy Fund and now include and ensuring that procurement practices members of Akwesasne who reside in the Cornwall area. Having blood work clinics available in all three districts as well the Satellite Tsi Snaihne Medical Clinic is a huge step forward for our community's health

All youth council members have been accepted and an upcoming swearing-in ceremony will take place. Currently looking at the process for an Elders Committee. We will be developing a charter, along with policies and procedures for this committee. We also spoke of some requests that have been brought forward for language programs and a Request for Proposal will be going out to the community and the next couple of weeks.

This design ensures that patients and residents can benefit from this service without compromising health and safety.

The TMC will provide a variety of services, including primary care, blood work clinics, immunizations, diabetes prevention and care programs, Jordan's Principle services, and mental health appointments.

"The opening of the Tsi Snaihne clinic is an example of service delivery that we strive for," said Acting Executive Director Shannon Roundpoint. "Our health department and leaders past and present recognize that there is a strong need to support residents of Tsi Snaihne who are burdened by the remote location of the district. It should not cost community members an hour of travel time to receive basic health services, and I commend all those who recognized this and worked to provide a solution. 


